Expert Group Meeting on evidence-based linkages between access to land and socioeconomic development and empowerment, especially for women

Background

This Expert Group Meeting (EGM) is part of an Agreement of Cooperation (AOC3: Land, women empowerment and socio-economic development) signed between UN-Habitat/ Global Land Tool Network (GLTN), and the Palestine-based Union of Agricultural Work Committees (UAWC) as part of a broader programme on land governance in the Arab region, funded by the German BMZ.

The area of work implemented by UAWC focuses on women and land rights, and delves into the identification of the impact of land tenure security on the socio-economic status of women in the Arab region, through adopting three integrated activities, A) an empirical study that examines this impact on the ground, B) a regional EGM, to exchange and expand knowledge about women's land tenure security and women's rights to land and its impact on their socio-economic development, and C) capacity building trainings for women and other land actors in society on the importance of land tenure for women, women's rights to land, and how to attain them.

Equal access to land and enhanced tenure security are crucial for poverty reduction, e.g. by providing access to financial and economic resources, by increasing food security, by enabling people in both rural and urban areas to invest in improved homes and livelihoods, by providing access to loans, which can be reinvested in business etc. Thus, access to and control over land by both women and men can trigger broader social and economic development. Land ownership, increased knowledge about the economic value of land as well as a secure access to land administration and land related services (surveying, planning, registering, etc.) are key factors for empowering people in both rural and urban settings. Access to land,

especially by the most vulnerable, can rebalance power relationships within the family, the community and the society. Access to and control over productive resources, including land, and independent income strengthens the land holder's autonomy and brings about long-term benefits for society. Land owners become managers of economic assets, control financial resources and undertake their own economic activities. This economic empowerment is particularly important in conflict- and post-conflict settings, by reducing the risk of displacement and eviction. Furthermore, land owners with land documents and access to land administration get more easily involved in local decision-making processes, which are – especially in rural areas – often related to the use of and the control over land. Previous interventions and studies have shown that secure access to land rights and ownership lead to increased civic engagement and public participation. The capacities and willingness to negotiate are increased.

Objectives of the meeting

The aim of this EGM is to bring together experts with different professional backgrounds (academic, civil society, government, etc.) and also grassroots women, in order to share knowledge and experience and to discuss and compare the state of women's access to and control over land in different countries of the Arab region, to identify challenges and to reflect on existing practices and approaches to enhance land tenure security for socio-economic development. To what extent does land tenure security correlate with different aspects of socio-economic and political empowerment, especially of women, especially in conflict- and post-conflict situations? What priority action should be undertaken by different land actors to improve women's situation with regard to housing, land and property rights?

The EGM will also be an opportunity to: (1) identify key land governance / management and tenure security challenges, especially for women in the region / countries; (2) identify the most relevant approaches and tools for improving access to land, especially for women, in the Arab states; (3) learn from existing experiences and identify areas of convergence and possible collaboration among stakeholders; and (4) consolidate priorities for the way forward.

Lastly, the results of this event will also feed into a broader study conducted by UAWC as part of the partnership with UN-Habitat and GLTN on the evidence-based linkages between access to land and socio-economic development and empowerment, especially for women.

After the identification of the challenges and obstacles that women in the Arab region face in this regard, it is imperative to come up with recommendations that set the priorities for actions by the various land actors to enhance women's access to, control over and use of land and land rights in general.

The participation of women in this event is crucial for their empowerment, as it cannot be achieved without taking into account the definition and understanding of the concepts and issues concerning them. Thus, alongside the experts, rural women will participate, to share their experiences and express their perceptions on land issues.

Methodology

1. The event includes panel discussions, during which key related topics will be presented and discussed by selected panelists who will carry on the discussion.

2. Different discussion groups will be formed each day, through which the key topics will be discussed more in detail.

3. Outcomes and recommendations of the discussion groups will be shared at the end session on each day.

The overall facilitation will be handled by UAWC staff, while other pre-assigned participant will be asked to facilitate the discussions groups

Key topics

- 1. Defining land tenure and women's socio-economic empowerment in the Arab region
- 2. Overview of women tenure rights in the Arab region: what do we know?
- 3. The nexus between socio-economic development and access to, control over and use of land for women.

- 5. Role of governments in enhancing women's land rights in the Arab region
- 6. Role of civil society organizations, academia, and individuals in enhancing women's land rights in the Arab region

Overall expected outputs of the EGM:

- Improved awareness of the activities being done by different stakeholders in the Arab region on land tenure security and its linkages with socio-economic development, especially of the most vulnerable and women:
- Practices and approaches to improve the nexus between land tenure security and the different aspects of socio-economic development (education, political participation, food security, social status, gender equality, etc.) are shared;
- Improved network between the experts and participants dealing with the topic;
- A database containing the presentations and the report of the outcomes of the discussions are shared (e.g. through a Google Drive file)
